

He attended Saint George Norwood on Saturday night for Vespers, followed by liturgy on Sunday at Saint George Cathedral in Worcester, wrapping up the visit for a Vespers service Sunday night at Saint George in West Roxbury. .

This retreat, commonly known as "WAMP", is something Orthodox teens from DOWAMA look forward to every year. This year, campers got to dress up as their favorite celebrities. 

Lenten Recipes

Trying to find foods to eat during Lent can often get tricky. That's why every month, NAC is giving you new recipes appropriate for the Lenten fast. This month one of our own NAC board members, Marina Zafaran, shares how to make her famous Lenten chocolate cake!



Ingredients

- •3 cups all-purpose flour
- •2 cup white sugar
- •1/2 cup cocoa powder
- •2 teaspoon baking soda
- •1 teaspoon salt
- •1 cup water
- •1 cup almond mílk
- •2/3 cup vegetable oil
- •2 teaspoon vanilla extract
- •2 teaspoon distilled white vinegar
- (optional) 1 tablespoon of powdered sugar for topping

Directions

Step 1: The most important step, make the sign of the cross right before you start, have a positive mindset, and bake this with LOVE.

Step 2: Measure all your ingredients, and have them prepared.

Step 3: Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C) Grease your Bundt cake pan.

Step 4: Sift flour, sugar, cocoa, baking soda, and salt together in a large bowl.

Step 5: Add water, almond milk, oil, vanilla, and vinegar; mix together until smooth.

Step 6: Pour mixture into the prepared pan.

Step 7: Bake in the preheated oven until a toothpick inserted into the center comes out clean, about 45 minutes.

Step 8: Allow to cool. Finally, sift powdered sugar on top, and share with your loved ones!! **Enjoy!!**

Spiritual Reflection

NAC encourages Orthodox Christians around the world to engage in Spiritual reflection. This month, Fr Phillip Rogers, shares his reflection on the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.



"For my eyes have seen Your salvation!" (Luke 2:30). These words were said by Simeon, the "just and devout" old man who had spent years "waiting for the Consolation Israel" (Luke 2:25), when he held the forty day old Jesus in his arms. Simeon had been prompted by the Holy Spirit to be in the temple on the day that Mary and Joseph brought the infant Jesus to the temple. By following the Spirit, Simeon was able to meet God face to face in the person of the 40-day old infant, Jesus Christ.


In the example of Simeon, we have an image for our own lives as we live with the hope of ourselves meeting God. Simeon is called "just and devout" because he was faithful and committed to God over and above anything else. His first priority was to unite himself to the God who he knew loved him. He lived this out with great patience! He is described as "waiting." And boy did he wait! The tradition is that Simeon was over 300 years old when he was able to hold Christ in his arms in fulfillment of the promise that "he would not see death before he had seen the Lord's Christ" (Luke 2:26). His patient devotion was finally rewarded when he followed the prompting of the Spirit and went to the Temple at just the right time.

We too can be like Simeon.

When we follow the prompting of the Spirit with patience and devotion, we too can meet God face to face. We will begin by meeting Him in the person that is next to us, whether that be our family or the beggar on the street who is created in the image and likeness of God. We will meet Him in the Church, particularly in the Great Mysteries like confession, unction and most especially in the reception of the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist. And after a patient devoted life filled with meeting God in those places, we too will meet Him fully face to face, just like Simeon and declare, "For my eyes have seen Your salvation."

"Beloved, now we are children of God; and it has not yet been revealed what we shall be, but we know that when He is revealed, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is!" (1 John 3:2)
